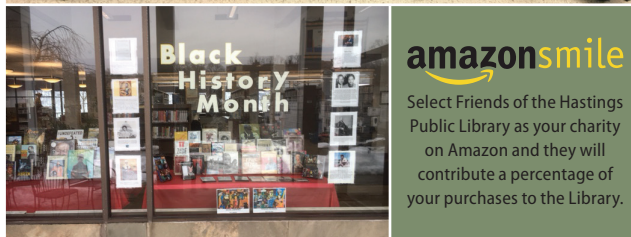

Dear Friends:

The above quote is among hundreds of comments received by The New York Times in response to its Feb. 14 "Love Letter to Libraries," a photo essay documenting the vitality and versatility of libraries across the country. The images, along with the accompanying text, unleashed a wellspring of responses from readers; the writers chose this irreducible observation to sum up how libraries better our lives.

In past years, the Friends' spring letter has been one way to trumpet all the outstanding programming and extensive upgrades that the organization supports at the Hastings Library and, on that basis, to appeal for your renewed membership. But the Times article paints the bigger picture, underscoring the universal value of this cultural, educational, and social resource, and why, with a chronic shortage of government funding, your individual support is critical.

In other ways, here in Hastings we have an embarrassment of riches: a superb library director with the calm and management skills befitting a former nursery school teacher, and a remarkable wellspring of resident talent and expertise to draw upon. Recent presentations by local authors and filmmakers have filled the Orr Room to overflowing — a joyous manifestation of the Library as promoter and proud showcase of this community's human capital.

Further expanding the Library's services, of late we have partnered with the Westchester County Board of Elections to become an early voting site. We are thrilled to provide more access to — and hopefully greater participation in — the democratic process.

Visit the Library's website to see the ongoing and upcoming opportunities to engage and explore — everything from book clubs to knitting lessons to story times. Of note: a nascent "New Caregivers Club" and a save-the-date post for the Friends' annual gala (as many of you know from experience, more like a giddy book-lovers' block party), set for Sunday, June 4. Remember that while the Village budget keeps the lights on, the Library's energy is fueled by the Friends — our dedication to an inquisitive, diverse public and institution of "so much good."
