Meeting Minutes

The minutes of the November 21st meeting were approved.

Budget

Village Manager Mary Beth Murphy asked Debbie to attend a meeting with her and Village Clerk Anthony Costantini to go over the library's finances. Mary Beth said that we need to be very careful with our spending for the remainder of the fiscal year so that we don't go into a deficit. Although our fund balance was \$132,000, \$80,000 of it was appropriated by the Village for FY 2024-25. They are planning to appropriate another \$80,000 for FY 2025-26, so we don't have enough in our fund balance to get us through to the end of the fiscal year. Debbie pointed out that we have very little money in our book line and that we cannot get through the remaining five months with what's in there. Debbie had been told that we could take money from surplus if that happened, but now it doesn't seem as though we can do that. Anthony will be printing out our latest budget on Thursday and Debbie will sit down with Peter to review, and then request another meeting with Mary Beth and Anthony.

Day-to-Day Operations

With staff taking some time off around the holidays, Juan and Greg filled in several times. Not only are they great workers but they are pleasant and efficient, and patrons are always happy to see them.

The library has been busy since January 1st, especially the children's area. The school district had two full weeks off and now with the FMS disaster, 5th and 6th graders will be off until Wednesday, January 8th.

Close to closing time on Saturday, Regina was cleaning up the newspapers and magazines and noticed political notes written in several of our magazines by a patron who lives in Yonkers but uses our library. He also left a bulletin from a local church with a political statement written on it by hand. When she brought the material to the desk to throw away, his wife came in, and Regina asked her to return them to her husband and to ask him to stop leaving propaganda on our shelves and to stop defacing our property. He came storming to the desk saying he was expressing his freedom of speech. Regina disagreed and said he was defacing our property. The patron then said, "You know, I can hit you!" She unwisely replied, "And I can hit you back!" She then collected herself and she suggested they take the matter up with the police. She walked with him over to the police station and they both made statements.

Adult Programs

Keeping It Real discussed Patti Smith's *M Train* on November 22nd. At this point, Mike has his regulars, but a few new people came as well.

Three intermediate ukulele classes took place in December. Those who participated loved them.

The last Local Luminaries of 2024 with Melanie Hoopes and JT Rogers was fantastic. The layout of the evening was great, they were so charming and engaging, and an audience of about 60-70 people loved it. Vicky Bugbee's showing of *State of Grace* was a technical disaster. Although it didn't help us at the time, we later learned that it was not our AV system that was the problem but the way she was trying to project it from her personal laptop. Vicky was so gracious about it all, as was the audience, and after stopping the movie about halfway through, she gave a lovely talk about the making of the film and she also answered questions. The audience was sympathetic and with her throughout, and many went home to screen it on their own.

She is going to talk about starting her own business as a Black woman and the important role libraries played for her in pursuing her career. It's set for Sunday, February $23^{\rm rd}$ at 2:00 p.m.

For Women's History month, Regina invited MaryJane Shimsky to speak about the Voting Rights Act on Sunday, March 2nd at 2:00 p.m.

Gil Reavil, a Hastings resident who presented at the library a few years ago on his book, *Nordic Noir*, is working on a new novel about John Singer Sargent and an artist's model whom he painted about 300 times. He will give a talk on Sunday, March 30th at 3pm, to include an overview of Sargent's life and work and his relationship with the model, Rosina Ferrara, that he met on the island of Capri. She later married an artist, George Randolph Barse, and lived in Katonah.
